Karuah River Rally 11-13 February 2005

We had six takers for the four day trip to the Annual Karuah River Rally organised by the BMW Touring Club of NSW in the Chichester Forest about 30km north of Dungog.

Friday morning 9am at the Batemans Bay Tourist centre, Jim Bain, Arthur Flower, Robert Overdijk, Jeremy Quyle, Bob Edwards and Nigel McFalane set off on the ride. Fortunately Nigel road a BM so at least we had one of those amongst our midst.

The day was excellent for a long ride and after a quick bite to eat at Maccers we soon turned off at Bomaderry to go up the Cambewarra Mountain into the Kangaroo Valley. Various winding backroads with great scenery took us around Bowral and Mittagong onto the old

highway from Colo Vale to Thirmerre for our next stop. From here via Warragamba into the Friday afternoon city traffic through hot and busy Penrith/Richmond heading towards the (in)famous Puty Road. At last out of the chaos and heading north again. With very little traffic on this ever lasting winding road and with a much better road surface then on my last ride here 20 or so years ago we soon lost sight of Jerry and Nigel and after an overnight stay at Singleton we caught up with them again the next morning at Dungog. Some confusion about the first night's stay.

The ride from Singleton to Dungog is breathtaking and a must for anyone, except the road surface which is 90% filled potholes in places. The little town was abuzz with motorcycles. Our last leg to the camp site included 10k's of gravel road from reasonably to rough. Jim missed one turn on the gravel and he finally showed up 3 hours later after a drink at the Dungog pub, he had done at least 100k's on dirt and that for someone who doesn't like gravel roads!

The Karuah river camp site provided a neat but small swimming hole to refresh ourselves. In the afternoon the numbers increased to at least 200+ bikes and plenty to gawk at. During the presentations of the various rally awards such as the "Virgin" award, it came to light that Bob and Jim had never been to a rally before and were able to claim an award. We should have received an award for "best dressed" in our distinctive shirts. The night went well with the obligatory short rain-forest downpour not dampening anyone's spirit.

Sunday morning was slow for most but not Nigel as he left early to be back at work on Monday. Jerry left us at Dungog to stay with family in Newcastle. The return trip was via Maitland, Cessnock Wollombi to Wisemans Ferry. From here we lost our way a bit due to the lack of a good map but on the positive side, we saw most of Western Sydney before finally getting to Liverpool and the freeway south. Mittagong was the last overnight stop with a relaxed Monday morning run home. This trip could well become another annual trip.

20 SOBERING POINTS FROM THE "HURT" STUDY

1. Approximately 75% of the 3,600 motorcycle accidents studied in California by Hurt *et al* involved a collision with a passenger car.
2. The remaining 25% involved collision with a fixed object, including the road surface.
3. Motorcycle mechanical failure accounted for 3% of accidents, most of this percentage was due to tire failure.
4. In single vehicle accidents, rider error was the highest direct contributing factor. The highest percentage of rider error type was loss of traction while cornering or braking on various sealed (paved) road surface conditions.
5. In multiple vehicle accidents, the driver of the car violated the motorcyclists right-of-way in most cases.
6. In multiple vehicle accidents, it was the failure of drivers to "recognize" (see) motorcycles in traffic.
7. The highest percentage accident configuration (type) is the car turning in front of the motorcycle at an intersection.
8. Weather was not found to be a factor in 98% of accidents studied.
9. Most accidents occurred within close proximity to the trip origin (the rider's home).
10. Post-accident motorcycle fuel system leaks occurred in 62% of all accidents studied.
11. More than 75% of all accidents occurred within 45° of the straight ahead, line of rider's vision, few occurred at the limits of the rider's peripheral vision.
12. Non-manufacturer modified ("chopped" frame or engine) motorcycles were over represented in the total number of accidents.
13. More than 50% of riders involved in accidents had less than 5 months experience riding the motorcycle they were on at the time of the accident.
14. Motorcycle riders with dirt-bike experience were underrepresented in the total number of accidents.
15. Post accident rider interviews indicated that "lack of attention to riding" was the most common "accident factor".
16. Injury severity increased with motorcycle engine capacity.
17. Large engine capacity motorcycles were underrepresented.
18. 16-24 year old riders were over represented.
19. 30-50 year old riders were underrepresented.
20. Nearly 50% of fatal accidents involved alcohol.
